Uxbridge Fall Fair thrills all ages

Even bigger plans for next year's massive anniversary

The Uxbridge Fall Fair ran this year from Friday, Sept. 5 to Sunday, Sept. 8 and though the festivities saw a rainy start, this certainly did not damper enthusiasm or attendance!



According to Kevin Alcock, Uxbridge Fall Fair President, over 10,000 people attended the Fair this year.

Alcock says, "We have the greatest vegetable show. The best homecraft building. The wildest tractor pull. There's just too much greatness to be seen and experienced at our fair to list here."

When my daughter and I drove into Elgin Park on Sunday, Sept. 8 there were throngs of smiling fair goers checking out the entertainment. However, the fair did not feel too crowded. There was plenty of room to explore, and lineups for food and rides were reasonable.

Sunday was toonie day, so every ride cost only \$2 in the Midway. Kids big and small were having lots of fun on the carnival rides.

After wandering past some exceptionally groomed cattle and fantastic specimens of poultry, Faith Fawns and I saw a big crowd milling by the outdoor riding pen. Dogs of all sizes and breeds were pulling their handlers about while cowboys and cowgirls walked around on western ponies.

The Canine Equine Challenge was taking place and raising money for a new animal shelter for Uxbridge-Scuog. First a dog and his person negotiate a fun course, and then a horse and rider tackle a combination of barrels, poles and a jump. The best combined time wins.

When the dogs and horses were done, a

brand new event took place that day. The Cowboy Obstacle competition proved to be very popular. More than 45 horse and rider teams

tackled the challenging course.

Larry Bonehill and his wife Kathy Bonehill organized the event, and Larry Bonehill says "It looks like the sport is in demand. I think people want to have fun with their horses."


Another new adrenaline-laced event introduced this year was the "Battle of the Badges". This is a demolition derby class where emergency workers (firefighters, police, and EMS workers) battle it out.

There will be chainsaw carving demonstrations, more interactive displays, improvements to the crafts and vegetable buildings, and something special in the Midway.
